#### From the Chair ...

Our sport has become the subject of a great deal of attention this year, not least of which has been the change of our governing body's title to Motorsport UK. Some quite notable changes, intended to benefit the sport at grassroots level, have already taken place but I suspect that's but a drop in the ocean of what is about to take place. I have an idea of some of what might be about to happen, but as I have no idea of the timescale, I'm not about to start playing guessing games.

The last couple of years have seen quite a change in our Championship structure. We have lost our Autotest and separate Loose and Sealed Surface Stage Rally championships, and for 2019 the Navigational Road Rally championships will be rested whilst a re-think takes place. However, 2018 saw the introduction of a Targa Road Rally Championship which, after a slightly sticky start in 2018, with several events cancelled, looks far more promising. The 2019 calendar looks much stronger and more "solid" in what is a growing discipline. The merged Stage Rally Championship has held its own, despite a couple of traditional events not running in 2018, and we will see that grow in strength too.

Remember that in every championship only a limited number of events count towards a competitor's final total, so even though discipline's championship calendar may have a quite lengthy list of events look closely and see which events you can afford to do and still complete the minimum number to score your best result. You might surprise yourself, and in so doing support our championships more fully.

I must take this opportunity of thanking those of you who attended our AGM in October, at which numbers were significantly greater than we have previously seen in Council meetings; the Executive can only conduct its role well with input from you all. I recently saw some minutes from another Regional Association – it already lacked a secretary and the Chairman had made it clear that he was unlikely to stand for re-

election at their next AGM. His view was that the whole Regional Association was "at crossroads" and that, if people were unwilling to stand for committee positions in the future, the viability of that Regional Association was in doubt. I did feel disappointed ... for them ... but I am proud to say we have a very strong Executive Committee, who value input from you all to help it operate effectively.

#### News in Brief...

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#### VNUK – Motorsport UK update ...

VNUK is a European Court judgement that threatens the future of all EU motorsport. It ruled that EU countries must look again at how they enacted EU motor insurance law in each country; the court's interpretation would require all motorsport vehicles to have compulsory third party motor insurance.

Motorsport UK has since been lobbying at the highest levels on behalf of UK motorsport, in conjunction with other industry stakeholders and the world governing body, the FIA.

In a positive development, the European Parliament's Internal Market and Consumer Protection Committee (IMCO) has now published a draft report, which recommends that vehicles used exclusively for motorsport should not be in the Motor Insurance Directive (MID).

A spokesman for Motorsport UK said:

"We welcome this latest development, which appears to be heading in the right direction, and will be working with the FIA to ensure a positive outcome. Motorsport UK has been making the case for excluding motorsport from the Motor Insurance Directive since 2014. The VNUK threat has not gone away but the direction of travel is looking more favourable and we will continue to lobby on behalf of all our members and stakeholders."

#### Notes from the Executive Committee Meeting, 9th December ...

*Jim Bee* was co-opted onto the Executive Committee as Assistant General Secretary, with the intention that he assumes the role of General Secretary from Howard West at the 2019 AGM ...

The Motorsport UK 2019 Yearbook will be available soon ....

Paul Parker is to remain as a member of the Motorsport UK Sprint and Hillclimb Committee.

The Cotswold Group will also be running both Autosolo and Targa Championships.

The recommendations for awards from the *ASWMC Club Development Fund* were unanimously approved by the Committee ... and will be announced at the Awards Presentation on 17<sup>th</sup> February ...

**Stage Rally** entry levels have been down this year, and both the Wyedean Rally and 2019 Brean Stages rally have been cancelled for at least one year ...

The winner of the **Best Speed Event of 2018** will also be announced at the awards presentation in February ...

**2019 Championship Registrations** were submitted as soon as the on-line form went 'live' ... the first entry was for the Car Trials Championship, possibly due to the relaxation of the Regulation D4.5.4 ...

*Forestry allocations* are reduced and there are no Special Stage Rallies planned in the region. Some Targa Road Rallies will be using the forests, plus Car Trials and a HERO event ...

**'Taster Events'**, to introduce new people and competitors into club membership, have declined dramatically – Go Motorsport representative Kevin Moore appealed for clubs to run these events whenever possible.

The **Cornish Motorsport Month** will run in September 2019, with many events already planned ... there do not appear to be any clashes with other South West events.

*The Watergate Bay Hill Climb* will run for the second time on 14/15<sup>th</sup> September 2019 ... this does clash with the MG Car Club hillclimb at Wiscombe and the NHCA motorcycle event the following day ...

The ASWMC will have a stand at the *BHP Motorfest at Westpoint, Exeter*, on June 16<sup>th</sup> ... Colin Anderson and Jim Bee will coordinate the organisation of people and cars for display from as many disciplines as possible ... an ASWMC leaflet may be produced to give to visitors advising them who to contact for particular event disciplines ...

The Exeter Court Hotel (postcode EX6 7UX) is at the foot of Telegraph and Haldon Hills, one mile from junction 31 of the M5, behind the Shell garage on the southbound side of the A38 immediately before/after the split with the A380 Newton Abbot/Torquay road.

#### Directions:

*From the North:* continue through J31 of the M5 onto the A38 and take the second exit marked 'Kennford'; pass the (closed) Gissons' Hotel on your left and the Exeter Court Hotel is 50 metres further on, also on the left.

*From Newton Abbot (A380):* take the slip road at the bottom of Haldon Hill, turn right over the bridge and immediately left; the hotel is 50 metres on the right.

*From Plymouth (A38):* leave the A38 at the **top** of Telegraph Hill by taking the second exit (after the Esso petrol station and American diner), signposted 'Kenn and Kennford'. At the bottom of the hill, merge with the A380 and then immediately take the first slip road (left). Turn right over the bridge (Give Way) and then turn left; the hotel is 50 metres on the right.

#### Ron Easton: 1916 - 2018

South Hams MC past-President, Ron Napier Easton, passed away on Friday 2<sup>nd</sup> November.

Ron was a great and loyal supporter of the club since it was founded over 50 years ago, with Autocross his chosen discipline. Competing in a TVR Vixen, he won numerous regional championships and took the BTRDA Autocross title in 1978. Pictured here at the 1986 British Autocross Championship final in Suffolk are (I -r) Clive Rayson, Ron and the late Phil Kempthorne.

Ron took up motorsport on his retirement at 55 when he moved to the South Hams, following his passion for cars and driving. He started with a few club events in an MGB GT and then bought his infamous TVR Vixen (with a BDA engine), which he successfully campaigned in numerous John Player No 6 Autocross Championships.

He always took pride in always driving the Vixen to and from events – and only needed assistance home on a couple of occasions over the years.

#### 2018 – Success on the Stages ...

After winning the 2015 ASWMC championship, Keith Richings and I wanted to prove it wasn't a fluke by going for the championship again in 2018, using a Vauxhall Corsa B rally car I built over 18 months in 2016 and 2017.

The new car was to be a vast improvement compared to the 2015 car, with a full weld-in, rather than bolted, roll cage, an upgrade to a Quaife F20 dog box (instead of an F13



syncro gearbox) and new AP Racing front brakes instead of those from the 2.0 litre Astra GTE. Our first two events – the 2017 TSH Stages in Cornwall and Abingdon – were shakedown events to sort out any teething problems that we expected we would encounter with a new build. Thankfully there were only a few small issues, none of them serious enough to stop us taking class wins in both rallies, so that was both a great start for the new car and a confidence boost for the start of the 2018 season.

The season started well with another class win at Brean, although the gearbox started making a terrible noise on the second day. A post-event strip-down showed that the diff bearings were 'shot', so a full gearbox rebuild followed.

Another class win at Caerwent followed, although an engine oil leak started on SS5; examination after the event revealed that the rear crankshaft oil seal was the culprit, and replacing it fixed the problem.

The car performed brilliantly again, with no issues, at two Down Ampney events, with class wins at each, although only one counted for ASWMC championship points; next up was the TSH Stages in Cornwall, and again we won the class with no issues ... apart from a bale stealing a wing mirror!

Unlike our 'shakedown' in 2017, this year's Abingdon event was fraught with problems; the throttle pedal jammed open twice on SS1, losing us about 10 minutes. On return to service it transpired that the brake pedal had ripped from its mountings; we were lucky in so far as we had an hour turn-around time, which gave us time to remove the pedal, weld it and re-fit it in time. On SS3 the main power cable chafed on the switch panel and caught fire, causing us to stop to put out the fire out, losing us another 10 minutes. Despite all these problems, we made it to the finish, 18<sup>th</sup> in class and 54<sup>th</sup> O/A ... but as first ASWMC crew we collected 18 championship points - so it was well worth battling on!

A new power cable and heavily modified brake pedal were re-fitted in time for the Brawdy Stages and despite the stresses of a boiling hot day the car ran faultlessly, and we took 2<sup>nd</sup>



in class and  $25^{th}$  O/A. The re-arranged Bovington Stages gave us another class win - and  $20^{th}$  O/A – and again the car was faultless.

At Caerwent we only had to finish ahead of our championship rivals to clinch the title, and another class win, and  $25^{\text{th}}$  O/A, did the job – a great result for the team and a new car's first season.

With the championship already in the bag, the final event – at Bovington again, but this time the Challenger Stages - was a chance to just go 'flat out' all day. We had a fantastic battle with another 1400cc Corsa, beating them by 24s and finishing 12<sup>th</sup> O/A. We were nearly 4 minutes ahead of the 3<sup>rd</sup> in class crew and 2m 22s ahead of the first 1600cc class B car - a great result for the final rally of our year.

The event, clerked by Mark Tredwell, ran smoothly despite being hampered by poor weather on Sunday, which led to the event concluding with one timed run less than planned, a decision that was supported by most of the competitors. A huge vote of thanks is due to all the individuals that



helped the event to run, especially Simon, Robert and Mark. The club hope to run the event, with a few small changes, again in 2019.



The club has also been looking at relighting the social side, combining this with motorsport in one new venture. An up-and-coming business – The Racehut – is a newfound 'gem' with sixteen race simulators, where competitors can compete against each other to head the results table. Club member James Hall has been organising a championship for three years and now has a strong entry of nearly a dozen competitors on every round

- it's a great way to socialise and natter about our mutual interests - motorsport and cars!

After an enforced "rest" in 2017, due to the loss of some key sections and no volunteer to take over the Clerk of the Course role, it became clear that we

needed to save it during 2018 or it might not return, and club members have put a lot of effort into keeping this event in the calendar over many, many years. The event dates back to the 60's in numerous guises, sponsored by garages such as "Vogue Motors", the "Olds Group", "Wessex Motors" (also part of the Olds Group) until it was renamed the "Hardy" in the 80's. A lot of effort was required to gain acceptance for the event in the national ACTC championship and at times it seemed as if we were fighting an uphill struggle as ACTC officers asked for more and more observed years. Eventually we were 'in', and up with the top events, and also ran motorbikes in later years which was gratefully accepted by many. It was this background that forged the determination among a small band of workers that it should not die - and so to 2018!

The addition of new sections to replace the lost Maiden Newton complex enabled the event to run and will give us, hopefully, time to build on this foundation for 2019. An excellent entry of 59 motorbikes and cars enjoyed the event's tests on a gorgeously fine day... although this unfortunately worked against us somewhat, as the sections were so much easier on Sunday than Saturday!



### 2018 Classic Reliability Trials Championship

The year started well with, mostly, 17 contenders signed on at events; just 8 were signed on at last year's Allen Trial. The trials in the early half of the year had good entries, plenty of mud and tough conditions. The popular Torbay trial had the added complication of the 'Beast from the East' and was - sensibly - stopped after 10 sections to enable all competitors and marshals to drive home safely. As we went into the summer break Matt Facey in his BMW led the table with Paul Merson, the man to beat in class 8, and Dave Haizelden in his class 5 Scimitar, not too far behind.

The second half of the season started in mid-September with Holsworthy's Taw and Torridge. Initially trials suffered with low entries in October, when there is a championship round each week, and this is not encouraging to clubs that spend a lot of time organising events. However, entries picked up later and the last two events in particular were very well supported, the Allen with 66 cars and the Camel Classic with 70 cars and motorbikes.

Previous Champions Craig Allen and Aaron Haizelden have not competed as much this year due to other commitments but usually won their classes when they did.

The Tamar Trial's experienced team produced an event with a good mixture of hills, which was well received. The Haizelden's Scimitars were the only ones to finish in single figures and were well ahead of the rest of the field. The infamous Angel Steps stopped all but three on the restart for seven and eight and no one managed the higher restart on 'Park Impossible'. 'Trevilla', with its gradient changes and bends made an excellent last section for all except class 8, which had yet another difficult restart. All the classes were won by ASWMC Championship Contenders.

The Kyrle Trial, with its steep wooded sections, had another rather disappointing entry but was enjoyed by those who took part, and finished in daylight. Aaron and Dave once again finished ahead of the field, but this time Aaron beat his Dad to take the overall honours. Ray Ferguson and Mark Smith both won their classes.

Camel Vale's Bodmin Trial took place a week later in Cardinham Woods. Here competitors have the opportunity to tackle the infamous 'Hoskins Hill' twice. Paul Merson, the guy to beat in Class 8, took overall honours and Dave Haizelden, Matt Facey and Craig Allen all won their classes.



A fortnight later the Hardy Trial was reintroduced after a year off and was blessed by a good entry including several class 0 competitors. Stewart Green's Gruffalo, a year after his first trial win, once again took the honours in class 8 and won the trial overall.

On November 25<sup>th</sup> Bristol's Allen Trial attracted a very good entry of over 60 cars. Conditions were very dry and local man Mal Allen won the event by going clean and posting the fastest Observed Test times. The main Championship contenders Dave and Paul were both second in class and remained tied on 83 points with Matt Facey just one point behind.

Going into the last event Paul Merson and Dave Haizelden were joint Championship leaders with Matt just one point behind. Ray Ferguson in the super charged Liege and Stewart Green, Paul's main competitor in the Specials class, were also not too far behind. Camel Vale MC's Camel Classic was the final event of the championship, so the pressure was on. The event had a full entry of motorbikes and cars, including several past champions. This very popular trial, with its long, tough muddy sections, is a very high scoring event with the overall winner dropping 25 points. Paul and Dave both came second in class but as Paul had a third place (6) to lose, and Dave only a second (7), Paul Merson finished by winning the championship by just a solitary point. Matt Facey and Ray Ferguson once again won their respective classes and finished third and fourth in the championship.

The 2019 calendar sees the return of the Clee Hills and Minehead MC's Exmoor Clouds to early September to avoid a very congested October. The permit application has been submitted and 8 contenders have registered already. The main issue for me, as coordinator, is obtaining results, especially when clubs do not indicate who is a Clubman's entry in dual permit events, which are becoming increasingly popular. Please help!

#### 2018 Southern Counties Autocross Championship

It seems a long time ago that 33 competitors from the mainland made the journey over the Solent to take part in the Isle of Wight CC Autocross. The weather looked ominous during setup on Friday, as high winds and rain came in across the stunning venue, but by mid-afternoon blue skies had returned just in time for the Red Arrows and fireworks to mark the end of Cowes Week. Simon Ford and Richard Davies took up the running for FTD, separated by just 1.2secs, but both endured mechanical failures on all but two of their remaining runs, finishing just 1.1 seconds apart.

The ever-impressive Alan Holly and John Rigden continued their close battle, hustling their big 4wd cars around the track and posting times that placed them in front of Ford and Davies. After a relatively steady start, Kieran Anderson began to gel with the track layout and posted times that would end up earning him FTD by 8 seconds. Luke Holly continued to dominate Class C with excellent, and consistent, driving, as did Stephen Frost with the Puma in Class A2.

Unfortunately, IOW CC are resting the event next year but hope to invite everyone back for 2020 - Southsea MC are hopeful of running a replacement event on the mainland.



#### Autumn 2018



The Witney GP took place over the August Bank Holiday weekend and Simon Ford, keen to put right his Isle of Wight misfortunes, took a comfortable FTD from Kieran Anderson. The heats involving Alan Holly saw him kept honest by son Luke (Class C Civic) on one and passed by Oliver Foord across the finish line as he ran slightly wide on the other. Kevin Stacey and the Saxo of Team Webb both rolled but both cars were back out after hasty repairs and set good times. Dave Lumsdale made up for his inversion on the IOW event

with a class win on his new car's debut.

South Hams MC used a new grass venue for their September event and the continuing excellent weather made for tricky conditions for competitors and marshals alike. The very technical track layout saw Oliver Foord in his element, setting the second fastest time to Kieran Anderson, with Simon Ford just 0.7 secs further back. Sunday brought an altered track layout, the times dropping slightly with Oliver Foord going fastest by 0.8 secs but then losing out to Kieran Anderson on the weekend's combined FTD by just1.9 secs; Simon Ford exited the fray when his engine cried enough.



Luke Holly's winning ways continued, as did Stephen Frost, with Barry Hews taking family bragging rights from son Aaron. The heart in the mouth moment came from Grace Holton on her final run of the weekend her Peugeot stepped out of line exiting the last corner and rolled, missing the bale in front of the timing van by inches. All that was audible from the on-board footage when the car came to rest was "SH1T!" Thankfully, Grace suffered only some bruising, but the car was in not such good shape.

And then, suddenly, it was the last event of the year, Torbay MC hosting the event that also formed the MSA Inter Association Challenge. Competitors from as far afield as Cramlington, Haverfordwest and West Sussex made the journey and a very good entry of 46 drivers were treated to a superb grass venue at Wilmington. Grace Holton was double driving Oliver Foord's Peugeot whilst Stuart Holton wheeled out the VW Golf for an airing after the South Hams MC event mishap. As the weather had been so good all year, the previous weekend's rain was soon absorbed and, with grip at a premium, times in all classes were remarkably close. One of the first runs of the weekend – the pairing of John Rigden and Kieran Anderson - saw them cross the line just 0.4 secs apart. Simon Ford was once again laying down the gauntlet but was just 0.3 secs shy of Anderson overnight, with Luke Holly posting top 5 times o/a and five drivers in A1 all on the same second!

The final day of the season didn't disappoint as the pace remained frantic; Simon Ford suffered a puncture which hampered his progress whilst Richard Davies was gifted a double drive - and the class win - in Stephen Spears' Special after the Welshman's car had to be retired on Saturday with mechanical failure. With Anderson taking FTD on both days, John Rigden took



2<sup>nd</sup> and Luke Holly finished a very impressive and worthy 3<sup>rd</sup>. Class A1 was decided by just 0.1 secs on both days of the event, with Aaron Hews beating father Barry on Saturday and then being beaten himself by Josh Burnell driving Allan Tapscott's Peugeot on Sunday.

The Inter Association Challenge was won by the ASWMC 1 team of Stephen Frost, Simon Ford and Kieran Anderson, beating the ACSMC team of John Rigden, Oliver Foord and Simon Taylor by 35 seconds.



With all events running, results and final championship standings are based on the best 14 scores. The 2018 Championship was won by Kieran Anderson, just 2 points ahead of Luke Holly; Michael Woolacott was 3<sup>rd</sup>, John Rigden 4<sup>th</sup> and Oliver Foord (the 2017 Champion), 5<sup>th</sup>.

There have been over 105 different drivers enter events this year, and hopefully more will actually register for 2019; Bath MC are returning to the discipline for the first time for a number of years at a new venue.

The subject of roll cages in Production class cars is an ever-discussed topic and will remain as 'Highly Recommended' for 2019 – it will most probably become mandatory for 2020. Windscreen condition will be under increased scrutiny during 2019 - you have been warned!

#### 2018 Autosolo Championship

My review of 2018 was largely complete in the Autumn issue, so this is more about looking back – and forward …

The number of rounds in 2018 was an increase on previous years, spread so that there were seven events in the far South West, to encourage more contenders from Devon and Cornwall, and seven in the East, with 9 rounds to count. Only Dave Fooks competed on the maximum number of events and there was no significant increase in registrations from the South West – so that plan didn't work. A visit to the two Cornish organising clubs, Camel Vale and Truro MCs, seemed to suggest several possible factors, including fewer local autosolo competitors, fewer entering motorsport at all, and Cornwall and Devon are a long way from the next nearest venues (Smeatharpe and Westonzoyland). Few contenders from the "East" (except Dave Fooks and myself) took part in the Cornwall and Devon events … and none travelled in the opposite direction. And some can't commit to a championship as they could not enter the maximum number of events. Recruitment seems to be the key, and so bringing people into clubs in the first place seems crucial.

There is some good news that will reduce costs in 2019 – Motorsport UK have removed the requirement for Competition Licences for Regional Autosolo championships (and some other disciplines). This means that all events can run as Clubman events, saving a little more on event costs as well! Not everything is settled in this regard, with BTRDA Championship rounds currently having to keep the requirement for Nat B licences, which will cause some complication. This should be clarified soon, but in the meantime, it looks like good news.

I'd appreciate any thoughts on how the championship could progress in 2019, particularly moving closer to some main objectives – increasing participation, providing opportunities for people to progress, including all areas of the Region, being different to other Regional Autosolo championships, supporting organising clubs and widening the awards. Can we do it? Let's give it a go! See you out there!
